At Princeton, he has been a member of Small Group I for four years and has studied with Rudresh Mahanthappa, Miles Okazaki, Ralph Bowen, and Nicole Glover. On campus he enjoys playing tennis with the Club team, playing video games with friends, and exploring new music. This fall, Jack will join Columbia University's Economics PhD program and looks forward to exploring the jazz scene in New York City.

Evan DeTurk '23 (Alto Sax) is a saxophonist, composer, and arranger from Seattle, Washington majoring in Molecular Biology and pursuing a certificate in Jazz Studies. While still in high school, he performed around the United States and Europe with the renowned Garfield High School Jazz Band. At Princeton, Evan has studied under David Liebman, Rudresh Mahanthappa, Darcy James Argue, and Miles Okazaki. He plays in multiple jazz groups as well as the Triangle Club Pit Orchestra. He also leads the funk band Gemenon and plays saxophone in the indie neo-soul band Hot Jupiter. His music draws from a diverse set of genres, with his most recent work combining jazz-style horn writing with live electronic music. He hopes to pursue a career in biotechnology or scientific research in addition to music.

Alex MacArthur '25 (Drums) is a sophomore from Newton, Massachusetts who plans to declare a concentration in history with certificates in French language & culture, European cultural studies, and values & public life.
