#### PRINCETON UNIVERSITY AFRICAN MUSIC ENSEMBLES

Led by **Olivier Tarpaga**, Senior Lecturer in Music and award-winning composer and choreographer, the **African Music Ensembles** (AME) at **Princeton University** offer students a dynamic and immersive exploration of Africa's rich and diverse musical heritage. Comprising two distinct ensembles, AME provides an in-depth opportunity to engage with both **traditional** and **contemporary African music**, drawing from the continent's vast array of rhythms, instruments, and cultural expressions.

#### THE DRUMMING ENSEMBLE

This ensemble focuses on the rhythms and sounds of **Mandingo** and **West African traditional music**, immersing students in the complex patterns and vibrant percussion techniques that have shaped the musical landscape of the region.

#### THE AFROBEAT ENSEMBLE

The **Afrobeat Ensemble** delves into the urban and contemporary sounds of Africa. This ensemble explores the diverse musical genres emerging from cities across the continent, from the iconic **Afrobeat** of Nigeria (popularized by **Fela Kuti**) to the infectious **Soukous** from the Democratic Republic of Congo. The ensemble also studies **Desert Blues** and **Tuareg rock** from the Sahara Desert, the traditional **Mandingo acoustic music** of West Africa, and a wide range of contemporary rhythms and sounds from cities such as **Bamako**, **Johannesburg**, **Kinshasa**, **Abidjan**, **Lagos**, **Nairobi**, and **Ouagadougou**. By engaging with these varied styles, students gain a comprehensive understanding of Africa's vibrant musical landscape, from urban to rural, traditional to contemporary.

African Music at Princeton University connects students with artists and scholars from all five regions of the African continent to enable vibrant creative experiences and the rigorous study of African music, dance, and culture.
